**TRANSFER TO FOUR-YEAR SCHOOLS – MC Counseling & Advising** Updated 8/27/10

These Montgomery College courses transfer into General Education Programs without question at Maryland public colleges & universities under the Maryland Higher Education Commission’s (MHEC) transfer agreement. This policy does not apply to private or out-of-state schools. To keep transfer opportunities open at schools **outside of the Maryland public system**, consider taking courses listed in **bold & italics** (these have demonstrated greater transferability to general education programs at private and out-of-state schools). The major(s) you’re considering may require specific courses in General Education – refer to individual school catalogs if a major or transfer destination is known. Choose by possible majors; if unknown, take the highest level based on placement/SAT scores. MA 130-132 might not transfer as a math requirement if an AAT-Education degree is not completed.
